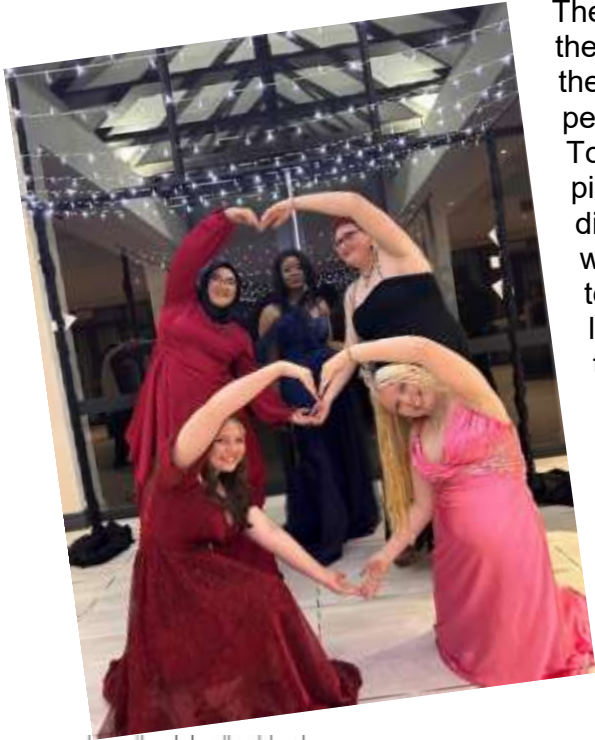
Cinderella truly was one for the books!
